Our country's leaders would do well to follow this value of Family in their leadership of South Africa. We would surely then have good reason to be hopeful of a rainbow nation.

BRAVERY IN DEFENDING FAMILY

Our Programme Team members (Social Workers and Social Auxiliary Workers) are those who directly support our Foster Mums and families in the communities where they live.

Every month there are many stories of how these team members put in extra time with emotionally charged situations in their work and so it is unusual for us to single any individual out. In this past month however, a very frightening situation arose where one of our teens was accused by a local gang of stealing one of their cell phones. They came to the home to find him and threaten the Foster Mother and family that if not returned by the following day, our young person would be hurt, or worse. We could obviously not leave the Foster Mum and her family to face these people, but who and what to do? The police were not an option as it would likely cause greater danger for the family going forward.



Boniswa Dyaloyi (Social Auxiliary Worker) stepped up to volunteer! She was able to contact local leaders in the community to join her for this meeting with our youth and the gang members. Thankfully it turned out well with proof that our young person had not been guilty of theft and the situation ended peacefully. The importance of being connected in our communities is highlighted, but it was the bravery of Boniswa that pulls family together in these moments.

HOME FROM HOME ART AUCTIONS IN SWITZERLAND AND AUSTRIA

Lilo Strolz, a passionate and energetic supporter of ours since 2020, has been volunteering at Home from Home each year for a month or more. Additionally, she has raised funds from her St. Anton, Austria, community through auctioning the art that our children produce through their involvement in the Orange Art Project. At the beginning of the year she announced that another auction would take place at the end of March, at the height of the skiing season, and asked that our Director, Peter, attend to open the auction.













Initially this seemed too costly trip to justify, however when we reached out to other stalwart Family Members (supporters) in Switzerland, they embraced the idea of Peter also visiting them and presenting to their groups of supporters. Erica Fretz, who runs the Jacaranda Foundation and Laura Schmiedeknecht, who coordinates Friends of Home from Home Switzerland, both volunteered to host Peter and coordinate opportunities for him to present the Home from Home cause to them. Laura organised a similar auction of our children's art at her local church and Erica has coordinated a fundraising music concert on the 14th June for us. These supporters, while far removed from the context of South Africa, have been loyal to our organisation for many years and continue to be enthusiastically involved, like family members in their support of us.



A MOTHER'S LOVE LIVES ON AFTER HER PASSING



Nomfundo Doris, a stylish and strict role model, dedicated herself to caring for boys. She worked as a foster mother at Home from Home for 15 years, blending compassion and authority to create a loving and stable environment for the vulnerable children in her care. Her unwavering love for the boys she cared for made her a tough yet kind and genuine woman.

The bond among Home from Home foster mothers was remarkable, supporting each other through personal hardships. Doris's memorial service at Christ Church, Kenilworth highlighted the organisation's vital work and the embodiment of family values. Emotional eulogies, accompanied by spontaneous humming and dancing, provided comfort and contrasted with more formal memorials in other cultures.

MICHELLE'S JOURNEY TO SUCCESS

Michelle's remarkable journey reflects the challenges faced by vulnerable children. Despite trauma, abuse, and disrupted education, some thrive against the odds.

At age 11, Michelle and her four younger siblings were welcomed to Home from Home after a tough life on the streets. It took resilience, therapy, compassion and grit to navigate the first few years.

Michelle did well throughout her schooling and received a bachelor pass in Matric. (A remarkable achievement, despite pandemic disruptions).

Michelle completed her psychology degree at the end of 2023 and graduated in April this year. She is 21 years old and no longer qualifies for foster care grant support from the State. Fortunately, Home from Home's Transitional Support Programme was able to offer her a place in our James Town transition house on the outskirts of Stellenbosch. Further support will be given to her as she searches for an internship position within her field of study.

Michelle's resilience, persistence and hard work has been impressive. With guidance, support and opportunity, great achievements are possible.



TRANSITIONING OUT OF FOSTER CARE

Jessica's path has been marked by significant challenges. In 2001, she was abandoned at a hospital and temporarily cared for at Nazareth House. After regaining her strength, she faced homelessness until being placed in Home from Home's care in 2008. In 2018, Jessica reunited with her biological sister, but changing circumstances led to an unsuccessful reunification. Jessica returned to Home from Home during her matric year, which presented its own difficulties as she had to readjust to foster care while completing her studies.

Despite these obstacles, Jessica completed her schooling in December 2020. Ordinarily, turning 18 would mean leaving foster care, but our Transition Support Programme allowed her to stay at our Westlake transition home. She completed hospitality and job readiness courses, and in 2022 she secured employment at a local Pick n Pay.

Now, after two years of permanent employment at the local Pick n Pay, Jessica has achieved yet another milestone: transitioning into independent living. Her unwavering determination and hard work have led her to rent her own space, moving beyond our care. We couldn't be prouder of her accomplishments!
